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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Superintendent and School Board
Lincoln County School District

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Lincoln County School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2006, which collectively comprise the Lincoln County School District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Lincoln County School District's management. My responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on my audit.

I conducted my audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and the significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. I believe that my audit provides a reasonable basis for my opinion.

In my opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Lincoln County School District as of June 30, 2006, and the respective changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, I have also issued my report dated March 6, 2007, on my consideration of the Lincoln County School District's internal control over financial reporting and on my tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of my testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of my audit.

The Management's Discussion and Analysis on pages 7 through 13 and the Budgetary Comparison Schedule and related notes on pages 45 through 47 are not a required part of the basic financial statements but are supplementary information required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. I have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, I did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

My audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Lincoln County School District's basic financial statements. The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*, and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. In addition, the Schedule of Instructional, Administrative and Other Expenditures – Governmental Funds is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by the Mississippi State Auditor's Office. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in my opinion, is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.



MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

The discussion and analysis of the Lincoln County School District's financial performance provides an overall narrative review of the School District's financial activities for the year ended June 30, 2006. The intent of this discussion and analysis is to look at the School District's performance as a whole; readers should also review the financial statements and the notes to the basic financial statements to enhance their understanding of the School District's financial performance. Information contained in this section is qualified by the more detailed information contained elsewhere in this District's financial statements, notes to financial statements and any accompanying materials. To the extent this discussion contains any forward-looking statements of the District's plans, objectives, expectations and prospects, the actual results could differ materially from those discussed herein.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- Total net assets, including the effect of prior period adjustments, increased \$4,469,836, which represents a 30% increase from fiscal year 2005. This increase in net assets is primarily due to the following: 1) capital outlays of \$1,713,939 during the fiscal year were not reported as expenses in the Statement of Activities but were capitalized on the Statement of Net Assets, 2) repayment of debt principal in the amount of \$668,300 was not reported as an expense in the Statement of Activities but as a reduction of long-term liabilities on the Statement of Net Assets, 3) sixteenth section sources generated during the fiscal year primarily from oil and gas royalties, timber sales, leases and earnings on investments, 4) a decrease in expenditures related to unfilled teacher positions at the elementary and high school levels, 5) a decrease in expenditures related to property insurance, transportation costs and payment of bus drivers and substitute teachers, 6) an increase in ad valorem revenue, activity fund revenue and various other sources of revenue, and 7) a conservative approach to spending during the fiscal year.
- General revenues account for \$18,644,757 in revenue, or 81% of all revenues. Program specific revenues in the form of charges for services and grants and contributions accounted for \$3,732,949, or 16% of total revenues. Special items in the amount of \$640,860, or 3% of total revenues, consist of insurance loss recoveries received during the fiscal year related to a fire at West Lincoln School in a previous fiscal year.
- The District had \$18,553,236 in expenses; only \$3,732,949 of these expenses were offset by program specific charges for services, grants and contributions. General revenues of \$18,644,757 and special items of \$640,860 were adequate to provide for these programs.
- Among major funds, the General Fund had \$15,868,771 in revenues and \$14,099,154 in expenditures. This resulted in an excess of revenues over expenditures in the amount of \$1,769,617 due primarily to 1) a decrease in expenditures related to unfilled teacher positions at the elementary and high school levels, 2) a decrease in expenditures related to property insurance, transportation costs and payment of bus drivers and substitute teachers, 3) an increase in ad valorem revenue, activity fund revenue and various other sources of revenue, and 4) a conservative approach to spending during the fiscal year. After net other financing uses totaling \$1,845,680, which included a transfer of \$1,500,000 to the 2005 Construction Fund, the net change in fund balance for the General Fund was a decrease of \$76,063 from the previous fiscal year.
- Capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation, increased by \$1,159,252 due primarily to the acquisition of land, construction of school facilities and the purchase of new buses during the fiscal year.
- Long-term debt decreased by \$656,254 due primarily to principal payments made during the fiscal year on existing long-term debt.

OVERVIEW OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the District's basic financial statements. The District's basic financial statements are comprised of three components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements, and 3) notes to the financial statements. This report also contains other supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves.

Government-wide financial statements. The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the District's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business. These statements are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting and include all assets and liabilities.

The statement of net assets presents information on all the District's assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as net assets. Over time, increases or decreases in net assets may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the District is improving or deteriorating.

The statement of activities presents information showing how the District's net assets changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in net assets are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal years.

The government-wide financial statements outline functions of the District that are principally supported by property taxes and intergovernmental revenues (governmental activities). The governmental activities of the District include instruction, support services, non-instructional, sixteenth section and interest and other expenses on long-term liabilities.

Fund financial statements. A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The District uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. All of the funds of the District can be divided into two categories: governmental funds and fiduciary funds.

Governmental funds. Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements, governmental fund financial statements focus on current spendable resources, as well as on balances of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating the District's current financing requirements. Governmental funds are reported using modified accrual accounting. This method of accounting measures cash and other assets that can be easily converted to cash. The governmental funds statements provide a detailed short-term view of the school District's operations.

Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the District's current financing decisions. Both the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities.

The District maintains individual governmental funds in accordance with the *Financial Accounting Manual for Mississippi Public School Districts*. Information is presented separately in the governmental fund balance sheet and in the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances for all major funds. All other non-major funds are combined together and presented in these reports as other governmental funds.

Fiduciary funds. Fiduciary funds are used to account for resources held for the benefit of parties outside the District. Fiduciary funds are not reflected in the government-wide financial statements because resources of those funds are not available to support the District's own programs. The accrual basis of accounting is used for fiduciary funds. The school District is responsible for ensuring that the assets reported in these funds are used for their intended purpose.

Notes to the financial statements. The notes provide additional information that is essential to have a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements.

Other information. In addition to the basic financial statements and accompanying notes, this report also presents certain required supplementary information concerning the District's budget process.

The District adopts an annual operating budget for all governmental funds. A budgetary comparison statement has been provided for the General Fund and each additional major special revenue fund.

Additionally, a schedule of expenditures of federal awards is required by OMB Cir. A-133 and is provided in this report.

GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Net assets. Net assets may serve over time as a useful indicator of a government's financial position. In the case of the District, assets exceeded liabilities by \$19,345,649 as of June 30, 2006.

The District's net assets are comprised of 1) net assets invested in capital assets, net of related debt, 2) restricted net assets and 3) unrestricted net assets. \$8,071,231 of the District's net assets (42%) reflects its investment in capital assets (e.g., land, construction in progress, buildings, improvements other than buildings, mobile equipment and furniture and equipment), less any related debt used to acquire those assets that is still outstanding. The District uses these capital assets to provide services to its students; consequently these assets are not available for future spending. \$3,856,063 of the District's net assets (20%) reflects its restricted net assets. A portion of the restricted net assets is expendable for school based activities, debt service, forestry improvements and unemployment benefits. The remaining portion of the restricted net assets is nonexpendable for 16th section investment purposes. \$7,418,355 of the District's net assets (38%) reflects its unrestricted net assets.

The District's financial position is a product of several financial transactions including the net result of activities, the acquisition and payment of debt, the acquisition and disposal of capital assets and the depreciation of capital assets.

The following table presents a summary of the District's net assets for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006 and comparative data for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2005.

The following are significant current year transactions that have had an impact on the Statement of Net Assets:

- Current assets increased from the previous fiscal year due primarily to an increase in cash and cash equivalents resulting from 1) a decrease in expenditures related to unfilled teacher positions at the elementary and high school levels, 2) a decrease in expenditures related to property insurance, transportation costs and payment of bus drivers and substitute teachers, 3) an increase in ad valorem revenue, activity fund revenue and various other sources of revenue, and 4) a conservative approach to spending during the fiscal year.
- Other assets increased from the previous fiscal year due primarily to an increase in cash and cash equivalents in the 16th Section Principal Funds which are reported as restricted assets on the Statement of Net Assets.
- Capital assets increased from the previous fiscal year due primarily to the purchase of various capital assets during the fiscal year and the increase in construction in progress related to the construction and renovation of school facilities and other improvements.

- Current liabilities increased from the previous fiscal year due primarily to an increase in accounts payable and accrued liabilities.
- Long-term debt outstanding decreased from the previous fiscal year due primarily to principal payments made during the fiscal year on existing long-term debt.
- Net assets invested in capital assets, net of related debt, increased from the previous fiscal year due primarily to the increase in capital assets during the fiscal year and the reduction of long-term debt related to the capital assets.
- Restricted net assets increased from the previous fiscal year due primarily to an increase in amounts restricted for school based activities and sixteenth section purposes.
- Unrestricted net assets increased from the previous fiscal year due primarily to sixteenth section sources generated during the fiscal year and an increase in fund balance of the General fund due to a conservative approach to spending, an increase in various local and state revenues and a decrease in expenditures due to unfilled teacher positions, property insurance, transportation costs and payments to bus drivers and substitute teachers.

Changes in net assets. The District's total revenues and special items for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006 were \$23,018,566. The total cost of all programs and services was \$18,553,236. The following table presents a summary of the changes in net assets for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006 and comparative data for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2005.

The following are significant current year transactions that have had an impact on the Statement of Activities:

- Program revenues increased from the previous fiscal year due primarily to an increase in operating grants and contributions.
- General revenues increased from the previous fiscal year due primarily to an increase in unrestricted state grants and contributions and sixteenth section sources.
- Instruction and support services expenses increased from the previous fiscal year due primarily to the 8% increase in teacher salaries.

Governmental activities. The following table presents, for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006 and comparative data for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2005, the cost of five major District functional activities: instruction, support services, non-instructional, sixteenth section and interest and other expenses on long-term debt. The table also shows each function's net cost (total cost less charges for services generated by the activities and intergovernmental aid provided for specific programs). The net cost shows the financial burden that was placed on the State and District's taxpayers by each of these functions.

- The net cost of governmental activities for fiscal year 2006 in the amount of \$14,820,287 was financed by general revenue, which is made up of primarily property taxes of \$3,680,660 and state revenue of \$12,321,907.
- Investment earnings accounted for \$262,635 of funding.
- Sixteenth section revenue in the amount of 2,194,939 was generated during the fiscal year from sixteenth section leases, the sale of timber and oil and gas royalties.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE DISTRICT'S FUNDS

As noted earlier, the District uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

Governmental funds. The focus of the District's governmental funds is to provide information on current inflows, outflows and balances of spendable resources. Such information is useful in assessing the District's financing requirements. In particular, unreserved fund balance may serve as a useful measure of the District's net resources available for spending at the end of the fiscal year.

The financial performance of the District as a whole is reflected in its governmental funds. As the District completed fiscal year June 30, 2006, its governmental funds reported a combined fund balance of \$11,476,693. The net change in fund balance for the fiscal year was an increase of \$2,647,921 due primarily to: 1) sixteenth section sources generated during the fiscal year primarily from oil and gas royalties, timber sales, leases and earnings on investments, 2) a decrease in expenditures related to unfilled teacher positions at the elementary and high school levels, 3) a decrease in expenditures related to property insurance, transportation costs and payment of bus drivers and substitute teachers, 4) an increase in ad valorem revenue, activity fund revenue and various other sources of revenue, and 5) a conservative approach to spending during the fiscal year. \$8,127,419, or 71%, of the fund balance is reported by fund type in the unreserved, undesignated section of the Governmental Funds Balance Sheet. The portion of the fund balance reported in the General Fund is available for spending at the District's discretion. The portion of the fund balance reported in the Special Revenue Funds will be used for school based activities. The portion of the fund balance reported in the Capital Projects Funds is a result of transfers from other governmental funds and will be used for capital improvements. The unreserved, undesignated portion of the fund balance reported in the Permanent Funds represents interest earned on sixteenth section sources that was not transferred to the 16th Section Interest Funds. The remaining fund balance of \$3,349,274, or 29%, is reserved or designated to indicate that it is not available for spending because it has already been committed. This portion of the fund balance is reserved for inventory, unemployment benefits, forestry improvements, debt service purposes and permanent fund purposes.

The General Fund is the principal operating fund of the District. The net change in fund balance for the General Fund for the fiscal year was a decrease of \$76,063. The net change in fund balance for the 16th Section 16-5-9 Interest Fund for the fiscal year was an increase of \$935,100 due primarily to the transfer of funds from the other 16th Section Interest shared funds. The net change in fund balance for the 2005 Construction Fund for the fiscal year was an increase of \$792,144 due primarily to the transfer of funds from the General Fund and insurance loss recoveries related to a fire at West Lincoln School in a previous fiscal year. The net change in fund balance for the 16th Section 16-6-8 Principal Fund for the fiscal year was an

increase of \$870,618 due to revenue generated from oil and gas royalties and earnings on investments. The net change in fund balance for the Other Governmental Funds for the fiscal year was an increase of \$126,122.

BUDGETARY HIGHLIGHTS

Over the course of the year, the District revised the annual operating budget. Significant budget revisions during the fiscal year are as follows:

- Budgeted amounts for revenue from local sources in the General Fund were increased primarily to reflect the increase in ad valorem receipts and activity fund revenues.
- Budgeted amounts for revenue from state sources in the General Fund were increased primarily to reflect the PERS credit received during the fiscal year.
- Budgeted amounts for instruction expenditures in the General Fund were increased during the fiscal year. Expenditures related to various projects were originally budgeted as facilities acquisition and construction expenditures but were actually reported as instruction expenditures. This also resulted in a decrease in budgeted amounts for facilities acquisition and construction expenditures in the General Fund.
- Budgeted amounts for transfers out of the General Fund were increased primarily to reflect the transfer of funds to the 2005 Construction Fund during the fiscal year.
- Budgeted amounts for revenue from sixteenth section sources in the 16th Section 16-5-9 Interest Fund were decreased to reflect actual revenues generated from sixteenth section leases, earnings on investments and the sale of timber.
- Budgeted amounts for transfers into the 16th Section 16-5-9 Interest Fund were increased to reflect the transfer of funds from the other 16th Section Interest shared funds.

A schedule showing the original and final budget amounts compared to the District's actual financial activity for the General Fund and other major special revenue funds is provided in this report as required supplementary information.

CAPITAL ASSETS AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

Capital Assets. As of June 30, 2006, the District's total capital assets, before depreciation, were \$21,467,293, including land, construction in progress, buildings, improvements other than buildings, mobile equipment and furniture and equipment. This amount represents a gross increase of \$1,515,668 from the previous year. During the fiscal year, the District purchased land, four new school buses and various items of furniture and equipment. The District also continued the construction of various school facilities, completed a bleacher project at Enterprise School and completed the new field house at Bogue Chitto School. Total depreciation expense for the year was \$540,925. Total accumulated depreciation as of June 30, 2006 was \$5,381,062, resulting in total net capital assets of \$16,086,231.

Debt Administration. At June 30, 2006, the District had \$8,128,393 in general and limited obligation bonds and other long-term debt outstanding, of which \$663,402 is due within one year. During the fiscal year, the District made principal payments in the amount of \$668,300 on existing long-term debt.

(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies.

The accompanying basic financial statements of the school district have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB). GASB is the accepted standard setting body for governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The most significant of the school district's accounting policies are described below.

A. Financial Reporting Entity.

For financial reporting purposes, the reporting entity includes all funds that are covered by the oversight responsibility of the school district's governing board. As defined by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the school district is considered a "primary government." The school district is governed by a five member board. Each member was elected by the citizens of the school district.

The Leasing Authority ("the Authority") as explained in the following paragraph is considered to be a blended component unit as determined by Section 2100 of the *Codification of Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards* and is included in the district's reporting entity.

The Authority is governed by a five member board which was appointed by the school district's governing board. Although it is legally separate from the school district, it is reported as if it is part of the primary government because its sole purpose is to provide financing for the renovation, improvement, construction, and equipping of certain school facilities. Therefore, all of the Authority's assets, liabilities, equity, revenues, expenditures and other financing sources and uses have been included in the government-wide financial statements of the school district (see Note 10).

B. Basis of Presentation.

The school district's basic financial statements consist of government-wide statements, including a statement of net assets and a statement of activities and fund financial statements which provide a more detailed level of financial information.

Government-Wide Financial Statements:

The Statement of Net Assets and Statement of Activities display information about the reporting government as a whole. They include all funds of the reporting entity except for fiduciary funds, if applicable. Governmental activities generally are financed through taxes, intergovernmental revenues, and other nonexchange revenues.

The Statement of Net Assets presents the financial condition of the governmental activities of the school district at year-end. The Statement of Activities presents a comparison between direct expenses and program revenues for each function or program of the school district's governmental activities. Direct expenses are those that are specifically associated with a service, program or department and therefore clearly identifiable to a particular function. Program revenues include charges paid by the recipient of the goods or services offered by the program. It also includes grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular program. Revenues which are not classified as program revenues are presented as general revenues of the school district, with certain limited exceptions. The comparison of direct expenses with program revenues identifies the extent to which each governmental function is self-financing or draws from the general revenues of the school district.

Fund Financial Statements:

Fund financial statements of the reporting entity are organized into funds, each of which is considered to be separate accounting entities. Each fund is accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts that constitute its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures. Funds are organized

into two major categories: governmental and fiduciary. An emphasis is placed on major funds within the governmental category.

C. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting.

In the government-wide Statement of Net Assets and Statement of Activities and the Statement of Fiduciary Net Assets, governmental activities are presented using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting as are the Fiduciary Fund financial statements. Revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recorded when the liability is incurred or economic asset used regardless of when the related cash flow takes place. Revenues, expenses, gains, losses, assets, and liabilities resulting from exchange and exchange-like transactions are recognized when the exchange takes place. Program revenues on the Statement of Activities consist primarily of state appropriations and federal awards.

In the fund financial statements, governmental funds and agency funds are presented using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when "measurable and available". Measurable means knowing or being able to reasonably estimate the amount. Available means collectible within the current period or within sixty days after year end. Property taxes, state appropriations and federal awards associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period. Expenditures (including capital outlay) are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred, except for general obligation bond principal and interest which are reported when due.

The school district reports the following major governmental funds:

General Fund - This is the school district's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the school district, except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

16th Section 16-5-9 Interest Fund – This fund is used to account for the expendable financial resources generated from the use of sixteenth section trust lands. Available funds may be transferred to the General Fund or Construction Funds and be used for appropriate purposes.

2005 Construction Fund – This fund is used to account for capital expenditures which are financed by transfers from the General Fund.

16th Section 16-6-8 Principal Fund – This fund is used to account for the sale of non-renewable resources (oil, gas, gravel, sand, etc.) on sixteenth section lands. The use of the fund is limited to providing advances to the General Fund or Capital Projects Fund to finance capital expenditures. State law requires any funds on hand to be invested. Interest income may be transferred to the General Fund.

All other governmental funds not meeting the criteria established for major funds are presented in the other governmental column of Exhibit C.

Additionally the school district reports the following fund types:

GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

Special Revenue Funds - Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than major capital projects) that are legally restricted for specific expenditure purposes.

Capital Projects Funds - Capital Projects Funds are used to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major capital facilities.

Debt Service Funds - Debt Service Funds are used to account for the accumulation of resources for, and the payment of, general long-term debt principal, interest and related costs.

Permanent Funds - Permanent Funds are used to account for resources that are legally restricted to the extent that only earnings, and not the principal, may be used for purposes that support the district's programs.

FIDUCIARY FUNDS

Agency Funds - Agency Funds are used to report resources held by the district in a purely custodial capacity (assets equal liabilities) and do not involve measurement of results of operations.

D. Account Classifications.

The account classifications used in the financial statements conform to the broad classifications recommended in *Governmental Accounting, Auditing and Financial Reporting* as issued in 2005 by the Government Finance Officers Association and are consistent with the broad classifications recommended in the *Financial Accounting for Local and State School Systems, 1990* issued by the U.S. Department of Education.

E. Encumbrances.

An encumbrance system is not maintained to account for commitments resulting from approved purchase orders, work orders and contracts.

F. Cash and Cash Equivalents.

The school district deposits excess funds in the financial institutions selected by the school board. State statutes specify how these depositories are to be selected.

Cash and cash equivalents consist of amounts on deposit in demand accounts and certificates of deposit with maturities of 12 months or less. Cash and cash equivalents are valued at cost.

G. Investments.

The school district can invest its excess funds, as permitted by Section 29-3-113, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), in interest-bearing deposits or other obligations of the types described in Section 27-105-33, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), or in any other type investment in which any other agency, instrumentality or subdivision of the state of Mississippi may invest, except that 100% of said funds are authorized to be so invested.

For accounting purposes, certificates of deposit are classified as investments if they have a maturity greater than 12 months when acquired.

Investments are reported at fair value.

H. Inventories.

Donated commodities are received from the USDA and are valued at USDA cost. Other inventories are valued at cost (calculated on the first-in, first-out basis).

The costs of governmental fund type inventories are reported as expenditures when purchased.

I. Capital Assets.

Capital asset acquisition and construction are reflected as expenditures in the governmental fund statements and the related assets are reported as capital assets in the governmental activities column in the government-wide financial statements.

Capital assets are reported at actual or estimated historical cost based on appraisals or deflated current replacement cost. Contributed assets are reported at estimated fair value at the time received.

Capitalization thresholds (dollar value above which asset acquisitions are added to the capital asset accounts) and estimated useful lives of capital assets are reported in the government-wide statements. Depreciation is calculated on the straight-line basis for all assets, except land. The following schedule details those thresholds.

J. Long-term liabilities.

Long-term liabilities are the unmatured principal of bonds, warrants, notes, or other forms of noncurrent or long-term general obligation indebtedness. Long-term liabilities are not limited to liabilities from debt issuances, but may also include liabilities on lease-purchase agreements and other commitments. In the government-wide Statement of Net Assets, long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the governmental activities column. (See Note 5 for details).

K. Interfund Transactions and Balances.

Interfund transactions and balances are the result of timing differences between the date expenses/expenditures occur and the date payments are made.

Short-term (due within one year) interfund loan receivables are reported as "due from other funds" and are considered available expendable resources.

Transfers are used to (a) move revenues from the fund that statute or budget requires to collect to the fund that statute or budget requires to expend them and to (b) use unrestricted revenues collected in the general fund to finance various programs accounted for in other funds in accordance with budgetary authorizations.

Interfund receivables and payables between funds within governmental activities are eliminated in the Statement of Net Assets. See Note 3 for details for interfund transactions, including receivables and payables at year-end.

L. Equity Classifications.

Government-Wide Financial Statements:

Equity is classified as net assets and displayed in three components:

- a. Invested in capital assets, net of related debt – Consists of capital assets including restricted capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes, or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.

- b. Restricted net assets – Consists of net assets with constraints placed on the use either by (1) external groups such as creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments; or (2) law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.
- c. Unrestricted net assets – All other net assets that do not meet the definition of “restricted” or “invested in capital assets, net of related debt.”

Fund Financial Statements:

Governmental fund equity is classified as fund balance. Fund balance is further classified as reserved and unreserved, with unreserved further split between designated and undesignated.

Fund reserves are portions of fund equity that are legally segregated for a specific future use or are not available for current operations. Following is a description of fund reserves used by the district:

Reserved for debt service purposes – An account that represents a portion of the fund balance that is legally restricted for the retirement of school district debt.

Reserved for permanent fund purposes – An account that represents a portion of the fund balances that is legally restricted for investment purposes or borrowing by the school board for capital expenditures.

Reserved for unemployment benefits – An account that represents a portion of the fund balance that is legally restricted for the payment of unemployment benefits.

Reserved for forestry improvements – An account that represents a portion of the fund balance that is legally restricted for improving sixteenth section forest lands.

Reserved for inventory – An account that represents a portion of the fund balance which indicates that inventories do not represent available spendable resources even though they are a component of net current assets.

Unreserved/designated funds balances are portions of fund equity that the school board has set aside for future projects or services. The unreserved/designated fund balance reported in the Capital Projects funds are funds that the school board has designated for future building projects of the district.

M. Property Taxes.

Ad valorem property taxes are levied by the governing authority of the county on behalf of the school district based upon an order adopted by the school board of the school district requesting an ad valorem tax effort in dollars. Since the taxes are not levied and collected by the school district, the revenues to be generated by the annual levies are not recognized until the taxes are actually collected by the tax levying authority.

N. Mississippi Adequate Education Program Revenues.

Revenues from the adequate education program are appropriated on a fiscal year basis and are recorded at the time the revenues are received from the state of Mississippi.

O. Compensated Absences.

Employees of the school district accumulate sick leave at a minimum amount as required by state law or at a greater amount provided by school district policy. Some employees are allowed personal leave and/or vacation leave in accordance with school district policy. The district pays for unused leave for employees as required by Section 37-7-307(5), Miss. Code Ann. (1972).

The liability for these compensated absences is recorded as long-term liabilities in the government-wide statements. The current portion of this liability is estimated based on historical trends. In the fund financial statements, governmental funds report the compensated absence liability payable from expendable available financial resources only if the payable has matured, for example, an employee retires.

(2) Cash and Cash Equivalents and Investments

The district follows the practice of aggregating the cash assets of various funds to maximize cash management efficiency and returns. Various restrictions on deposits and investments are imposed by statutes. These restrictions are summarized below:

Deposits. The school board must advertise and accept bids for depositories no less than once every three years as required by Section 37-7-333, Miss. Code Ann. (1972). The collateral pledged for school district deposits in financial institutions are held in the name of the Mississippi State Treasurer under a program established by the Mississippi State Legislature and is governed by Section 27-105-5, Miss. Code Ann. (1972). Under this program, the school district's funds are protected through a collateral pool administered by the State Treasurer. Financial institutions holding deposits of public funds must pledge securities as collateral against those deposits. In the event of failure of a financial institution, securities pledged by that institution would be liquidated by the State Treasurer to replace the public deposits not covered by the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation.

Investments. Section 29-3-113 and 37-59-43, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), authorizes the school board to invest surplus funds in the types of investments authorized by Section 27-105-33 (d) and (e), Miss. Code Ann. (1972) and investments authorized under Section 27-105-365 Miss. Code Ann. (1972). That authority permits the following types of investments: (a) certificates of deposit and interest bearing accounts; (b) direct US Treasury obligations; (c) US Government agencies, US Government instrumentalities or US Government sponsored enterprise obligations; (d) direct security repurchase agreements and reverse direct security repurchase agreements of any federal book entry of those securities enumerated in (b) and (c) above; (e) direct obligations of the US in open-end or closed-end of any management type investment company; (f) in a trust consisting of pooled or commingled funds that includes investments in commercial paper and bankers acceptances or other short-term obligations issued by banks having one (1) of the two (2) highest short-term rating categories of either Standard Poor's Corporation or Moody's Investors Service, or corporate notes and bonds having one (1) of the three (3) highest long-term rating categories of either Standard Poor's Corporation or Moody's Investors Service, or in any open-ended or closed-ended management-type investment company or investment trust registered under the provisions or 15 USCS Section 80(a)-1 et seq. Investment income on bond funds (Capital Projects), bond sinking funds (Debt Service Funds) and sixteenth section principal funds (Permanent Funds) must be credited to those funds. Investment income of \$100 or more of any fund must be credited to that fund. Amounts less than \$100 can be credited to the General Fund.

Cash and Cash Equivalents.

The carrying amount of the school district's deposits with financial institutions reported in the governmental funds and fiduciary funds was \$10,817,177 and \$676,316, respectively. The carrying amount of deposits reported in the government-wide financial statements was: Cash and Cash Equivalents - \$8,127,947 and Restricted Assets - \$2,689,236. The Restricted Assets represents the cash balance of the sixteenth section principal fund (Permanent Fund) which is legally restricted and may not be used for purposes that support the district's programs. The bank balance was \$12,851,904.

Custodial Credit Risk – Deposits. Custodial risk is the risk that in the event of a depository failure, the school district deposits may not be returned to it. The school district does not have a formal policy for custodial credit risk. However, state law permits the Mississippi State Treasurer's office to manage that risk on behalf of the school district. Deposits above FDIC coverage are collateralized by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent in the name of the Mississippi State Treasurer on behalf of the district. By signed agreement the Mississippi State Treasurer's office is acting on behalf of the school district.

E. Compensated absences payable.

As more fully explained in Note 1(O), compensated absences payable is adjusted on an annual basis as required by Section 37-7-307(5), Miss. Code Ann. (1972). Compensated absences will be paid from the fund from which the employees' salary were paid.

(6) Defined Benefit Pension Plan.

Plan Description. The school district contributes to the Public Employees' Retirement System of Mississippi (PERS), a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan. PERS provides retirement and disability benefits, annual cost-of-living adjustments, and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. Benefit provisions are established by state law and may be amended only by the State of Mississippi Legislature. PERS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. That report may be obtained by writing to Public Employees' Retirement System of Mississippi, PERS Building, 429 Mississippi Street, Jackson, MS 39201 or by calling (601) 359-3589 or 1-800-444-PERS.

Funding Policy. PERS members are required to contribute 7.25% of their annual covered salary, and the school district is required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. The current rate is 10.75% of annual covered payroll. The contribution requirements of PERS members and employers are established and may be amended only by the State of Mississippi Legislature. The school district's contributions to PERS for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2006, 2005 and 2004 were \$951,410, \$941,742 and \$904,050, respectively, which equaled the required contributions for each year.

(7) Other Commitments.

(8) Sixteenth Section Lands.

Sixteenth section school lands, or lands granted in lieu thereof, constitute property held in trust for the benefit of the public schools. The school board, under the general supervision of the Office of the Secretary of State, has control and jurisdiction of said school trust lands and of all funds arising from any disposition thereof. It is the duty of the school board to manage the school trust lands and all funds arising therefrom as trust property. Accordingly, the board shall assure that adequate compensation is received for all uses of the trust lands, except for uses by the public

(9) Risk Management.

The school district is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. Except as described below, the district carries commercial insurance for these risks. Settled claims resulting from these insured risks have not exceeded commercial insurance coverage in any of the past three fiscal years.

Participation in Public Entity Risk Pool.

The school district is a member of the Mississippi School Boards Association Workers' Compensation Trust (MSBAWCT). The trust is a risk-sharing pool; such a pool is frequently referred to as a self-insurance pool. The trust consists of approximately 119 school districts and covers risks of loss arising from injuries to the school district's employees. The Mississippi Workers' Compensation Commission requires that an indemnity agreement be executed by each member in a workers' compensation self-insurance pool for the purpose of jointly and severally binding the pool and each of the employers comprising the group to meet the workers' compensation obligations of each member. Each member of MSBAWCT contributes quarterly to a fund held in trust. The funds in the trust account are used to pay any claim up to \$500,000. For a claim exceeding \$500,000, MSBAWCT has insurance which will pay the excess up to \$25,000,000. If total claims during a year were to deplete the trust account, then the member school districts would be required to pay for the deficiencies. The district has not had an additional assessment for excess losses incurred by the pool.

(10) Trust Certificates.

A trust agreement dated June 1, 1998, was executed by and between the school district and the Trustmark National Bank, as trustees.

The trust agreement authorized the issuance of trust certificates in the principal amount of \$2,000,000. Approximately \$1,992,663 was used to provide financing for the construction and renovation of school buildings and related facilities and equipment (the "project"); the remainder of approximately \$7,337 was used to pay the cost of issuance.

The project is leased to the school district in accordance with the provisions of the Emergency School Leasing Authority Act as described in Section 37-7-351, *et seq.*, Miss. Code Ann. (1972). The lease represents a capital lease under which ownership of the project will transfer to the school district upon complete retirement of the trust certificates. The school district is obligated to make lease payments to the trustee in an amount equal to the debt service requirements for the trust certificates. The lease rental payments by the school district are used by the

trustee to pay the principal and interest payments due on the trust certificates. It is not anticipated the project will have sufficient value to satisfy the certificates in the event the school district defaults under the lease; therefore, the source of payment of the certificates is the responsibility of the school district. See Note 5 for details regarding the debt service requirement on the trust certificates.

Using the guidance provided in Section 2100 of the Codification of Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards dealing with defining the reporting entity, the trust accounts created by this trust agreement were deemed to constitute an inseparable part of the school district. Therefore, the assets, liabilities, equity, revenues, expenditures and other financing sources/uses of the trust accounts created by this trust agreement are part of the school district's financial statements, thereby eliminating the effects of the lease agreement for financial reporting purposes.
